


A rich manufacturing heritage

When Bailie John Hardie introduced the first stocking frames to Hawick in 1771, he could not have imagined what he was about to create. In less than 100 years the town was to be at the very heart of the knitwear trade in Scotland.

By 1800 up to 3,000 people were employed in Hawick producing hosiery, carpets, linen and woollen goods. During the second half of the 1800's steam power began to replace water power and the size and number of mills grew further.

The scale of the textile industry in Hawick grew to such a size, that by 1870 over a million pounds in weight of wool was being turned each year into a range of goods. Production was not restricted to knitwear and tweed became highly popular in the early and mid 1800's with weaving being established in Hawick with similar success.



Times may have changed, but to this day, Hawick's success has been built on a highly skilled workforce producing top quality products, with manufacturers leading the way in both innovation and design.

THE BORDERS DISTILLERY



The first Scotch Whisky distillery to open in the Scottish Borders since 1837, this new distillery is dedicated to making great Single Malt Scotch Whisky.

The Borders Distillery uses barley grown on twelve local farms; all within 35 miles of the distillery. Water is drawn from the Teviot and from a borehole directly underneath. Once distilled, new make spirit is sent for filling into casks or redistilled into Gin and Vodka using their Carterhead still. The distillery is housed in an old Victorian factory site, completely renovated with a low carbon future in mind. The building retains original features making it both familiar and new. Join one of the distillers for a tour to learn about Scotch Whisky and the award-winning architecture, before taking some time to enjoy a wee dram.

Alongside Scotch Whiskies, Gins and Vodka, the Visitor Centre sells a range of carefully selected local products and gifts.



The Distillery is located within a fully renovated building that was once the Hawick Urban Electricity Company whose first customer was the Hawick Temperance Society in 1903!

The Distillery will make the equivalent of 7 million bottles of single malt every year all from locally grown barley.

William Lockie was employed in the hosiery trade by William Laidlaw & Sons in their finishing department. During the late 1860s, Laidlaw's decided to abandon hosiery and sold off all of their equipment, creating an opportunity for William Lockie to branch out on his own as a hosiery manufacturer.

"The Home of Tweed". The product that we all recognise as Tweed has its origins in Commercial Road. Hawick, just a few yards away from where Lovat Mill stands today.

The term Tweed was coined quite accidentally in 1826 as the result of a misread label on a shipment of woven wool 'Tweels' (the Scots word for twill) from weaver William Watson of Commercial Road in Hawick to a London cloth merchant.
